Construction financials

Though a few items remain to be finished as we close out our addition project, we can now report some totals, as presented at the congregational meeting on Jan. 19:

Grand Total Project Spending ... \$889,206.98 Remaining available for optional projects ... \$3,996.99 Remaining for lobby furniture ... \$549.97

The plans presented to the congregation in 2018 included, additionally, an athletic-safe floor, parking lot paving and remodeling of areas in the original building (Phase II). The sanctuary roof also needs repair. Moving ahead with these items will be up to us in the future.

The Board of Elders thanks the congregation for its generous giving to complete Phase I. All glory to God for His management of this major project, debt-free. Let's see what else He has planned for CrossWay!

'Wednesday Night Lent Light' - A 40-Day Observance for Lent 2020

Just as many folks can't remember having 20/20 vision, many are also adjusting to the fact that we have begun another decade: 2020. We can't actually see the passage of time, but we do feel the effects, not only of our bodies changing but also of everything around us inexorably moving forward, sometimes for the better, sometimes not.

Lent is a time for renewed spiritual vision, looking backward and inward and upward in order to look and move forward. It is a season in which many millions of Christians will pause for special reflection, prayer and spiritual disciplines.

May I ask you to meditate upon the words of David Tripp. He writes of Lent:

"It is a time of spiritual combat, of exercises in selfcontrol and mastery over temptation and self.

"It is characterized by confidence in spiritual victory through grace. It is a resolute donning of the Christian's armor.

"It represents an opportunity for spiritual growth, but this personal growth will be reflected in outward goodness and good effects upon others. Lent calls Christians to be better spouses, parents and children, to find new harmony in their family life. There is a new purity in thought and personal relationships. The special temptations, such as self-righteousness and hypocrisy which are attendant upon religious practice, will be seen for what they are and confronted."

I invite you to join your CrossWay family for the 40-day observance of Lent that we call "Wednesday Night Lent Light." It begins on Wednesday, Feb. 26, at 6-7:30 p.m., and continues each Wednesday through April 1.

We will gather for:

- ... a Light Lenten Meal of soups and breads (40 minutes), followed by
- ... a Lesson for Biblical understanding, spiritual reflection, prayer and practical application (40 minutes).



This is an opportunity to gather and to invite others to join us for a season of spiritual renewal in preparation for "Holy Week" and Easter. You will find the weekly teaching themes and Biblical topics listed below and in Sunday bulletin inserts.

This message from Pastor Bob Manuel

What is a "good" church?

When I spend time with other pastors, it is not uncommon to hear the phrase or the idea that says, "Oh, yes, that's a good church." I have often wondered what exactly is meant by that idea. What exactly is a "good" church?

To answer that question, we must first consider a few things a good church is not:

- A good church is not necessarily a big church—
 or a small church. That is, size really has little
 biblical bearing on whether or not the church is
 "good."
- A good church is not necessarily one that always makes you feel good. There are many feel-good churches in our day that Jesus would tell you to stay away from.
- A good church is not necessarily one that is doing "good" things for the community. Yes, it's good to do good things (!), but if a church is engaging only with "justice" issues and leaves Gospel truth out of things, it ceases to be a good church.

What other things would you mention as not necessarily signs of a good church?

Attempting to describe a "good" church could take up a full book, but since we are spending our Sunday mornings in I & II Peter this year, let me take some cues from Peter of what is meant by a "good" church.

As you read these descriptors, it would be good to bear in mind something I wrote in my recent Jan. 19 bi-annual report to the congregation: "Hell doesn't care how idealistic we are, or even whether our ideals are noble, so long as we never put them into practice." **CrossWay Community Mission Statement:**

So, what I'll share with you from Peter's epistles should not be read as "ideals" but as descriptors of real-life obedience to our Lord. To the extent these ideals are only talked about or dreamed of but not practiced, that will be the degree to which we could no longer be considered a good church. This list is not meant to be exhaustive! Consider, then:

- A good church is eagerly looking forward to the return of Jesus. (I Peter 1:13; II Peter 3:8-10)
- A good church has people who are energetically practicing biblical holiness. (I Peter 1:14-16; 2:11-12; 4:1-6; II Peter 1:3-11; 3:11-14)
- A good church practices sincere and deep love for one another. (I Peter 1:22; 4:8)
- A good church is full of people who crave/love the Word of God. (I Peter 2:2; II Peter 3:1-2)
- A good church is full of people who love to praise God. (I Peter 2:9)
- A good church's default mode is to respect, not bad-mouth, the civil authorities. (I Peter 2:13-17)
- A good church is full of people who know how to suffer well. (I Peter 2:18-25; 3:8-17; 4:12-19)
- A good church is full of husbands and wives who love and respect one another. (I Peter 3:1-7)
- A good church is full of people who pray and are serving one another. (I Peter 4:7-11; 5:1-5)
- A good church is aware of and avoids false teaching and teachers. (II Peter 2:1-22; 3:3-7, 17)

A couple of closing questions for you as you ponder the "good" church:


- As you read the list above, how are you personally helping or hurting our call to be a good church?
