
#### Treasures that will change your life

As mentioned in last month's *Current* article, I will be offering some reflections on how we interact with God in "time." Songwriter/Bible teacher Michael Card's song "In the Beginning" will serve as a jumping-off point for these reflections. Here's the stanza that has served to shape and greatly encourage me over the years:

He hands us each new moment saying My child, begin again.

My child, begin again. You're free to start again. This very moment is filled with His power that we might start anew.

To break us away from the past and the future He does what He must do.

To some extent and perhaps for different reasons, I believe we all tend to "live" in either the past or the future. Living in the present is far more difficult. Card says, "This very moment is filled with His power, that we might start anew." Do we believe that?

At a deep level, I think we do believe this, and it is precisely because we know God wants to meet with us, we avoid Him by "living" in the past or the future. As for the past, here are some reasons I have found, both from personal experience and talking to others, why we tend to "live" in the past:

• We think somehow "beating ourselves up" over our failures and sins shows God we are "serious" about walking with Him. In reality, this is a way to NOT walk with Him, because among other things, we are NOT trusting the love and forgiveness He offers us through the Gospel of His dear Son. By doing this, we commit idolatry, because we are telling God our declaration of our guilt and shame is more weighty than He is and the forgiveness He offers us through His Gospel.

# Evading God by Living in the Past



- We believe God's forgiveness as a doctrine but do not feel His forgiveness at the personal level. His forgiveness is in our "heads" but not our "hearts." Because of this, we can't/won't forgive ourselves over some failure or sin.
- Related to the above, living in the past gives us a sense of control as the shame/guilt/anger toward ourselves keeps us from trusting God by appropriating His grace.

While there may be other reasons why we tend to live in the past, what, as Card suggested, might God do to break us away from the past? I suggest two things:

- First, God will illuminate the Gospel of His Son Jesus upon your life. Jesus and His forgiveness and grace becomes more real. Your sanctification (enjoying and becoming more like Jesus) can perhaps best be understood as the art of getting used to your justification.
- God will allow the pain of living/hiding in your past to surpass any sense of refuge you used to find there. He bids you to come to Him now.

Last month I suggested meeting God in the "now" of today can be "terrifying" and liberating. I think meeting God often includes a mixture of both holy fear and a joyful freedom to fully be what He has made us to be. Both fear and freedom require the humility of trust.

There. That's a "teaser" to get you to read next month's article.

GlobalFingerprints benefits needy children and their families, working through a church/ church-planting setting to build up families, communities, and churches, bringing the Gospel to hungry children.


CrossWay is in the process of selecting a child for our sponsorship as a congregation and invites our folks to participate by searching the


#### Home at last, for a little while

### Eritrea report



Located on the Red Sea, Eritrea is governed by a totalitarian regime that seeks to control every aspect of life. Some have compared Eritrea to the "hermit kingdom" of North Korea, as it is one of the most secretive and isolated countries in the world. In 2002, the government outlawed every religion except Islam, Orthodox Christianity, Roman Catholicism and the Lutheran Church. All other religious groups are illegal, and the government heavily controls approved churches, including their messages. Despite these hardships, the underground church in Eritrea continues to grow due to the faithfulness of church leaders both inside and outside the country. The population is evenly divided between

Christians and Muslims. The authoritarian government arrests, imprisons and harasses Christians.

There are many Christians being held for several years without trial, forced to work at hard labor and to "live" in shipping containers with no ventilation or plumbing. Yet, they are faithful.
