Budapest bound



On Sunday, Apr. 24, Matyas and Kate Kondor addressed our adult Sunday School in the South Wing while their three- and five-year-old children got to know our youngsters at the other end of the building.

The Kondors have served the Lord in Ukraine for several years and are now raising support in preparation for joining EFCA's ReachGlobal Budapest (Hungary) City Team in July.

They gave us insight into the war in Ukraine and explained their plans for future service. They are under consideration for support through CrossWay's Missions budget. Individuals are also welcome to pledge their personal support; check with Pam Reed.

Our friends Dr. Luke and Nancy Cutherell are preparing for a new role with their sending organization TEAM after many years of leading the staff at Bach Christian Hospital (BCH), Abbottabad, Pakistan.

Though Dr. Luke will retain the title of CEO, he will be working with Bach's new medical director, a Pakistani doctor who was born at the 66-year-old facility and has worked with them there for 10 years. The transition is a delicate one, as Dr. Ambrose Emmanuel is younger than some other staff physicians, but Dr. Luke is confident that "he has a heart for the Lord, has demonstrated that he is a visionary, with the energy to act on that vision. He has demonstrated a commitment to BCH and is willing to communicate and seek advice."

Cutherells will also be helping TEAM provide administrative support to BCH, encouraging friends who have come to faith, and recruiting for BCH and for TEAM's medical work in other countries.

I'm sure most of us are aware of the saying, "April showers bring May flowers." As Michiganders, we know April in springtime teases us. A bit of sun here and there, more "grey" skies perhaps than clear, and, of course, lots of rain! But we endure, as you know, because, as the saying goes, we know that the "flowers" are coming. And not just flowers, but green grass, leaves on trees, fruits, vegetables, singing birds and all the sights, sounds and smells associated with the life of summer.

In this brief article, I'd like to equate the "flowers" of May with the *character qualities of Jesus Christ* we all long to see in our lives. You see, in Scripture we are told to "take off the old self," that is, things that characterize our earthly nature. (see Colossians 3:5-9) We are then urged to "put on" our new self. In the context of Colossians 3, these new things we put on are expressions of the life of Jesus in us. They are things such as compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, patience, forgiveness and love. (Colossians 3:12-14) Look, too, at Galatians 5:22 and the fruit of the Spirit that is borne in us as we walk with and under the leadership of Jesus.

So, I will ask at this point, which of these "flowers" (fruit!) are you longing to see grow in your life during this month of May and beyond? Let me suggest some ways in which you can see a desired flower/fruit grow in your life. For example, I find in my own life that I am not nearly as humble or patient as I'd like to be. For a variety of reasons, I struggle with seeing these flowers of humility and patience bloom in my life. So, what do I do? How can I "put on" these expressions of the character of Jesus? As I put on these virtues, let me suggest five key words that will help us experience the May flowers of Jesus' life. These words are **Confession, Thanksgiving, Expectancy, Submission** and **Celebration**.

The flowers are coming

First, let me say that these are not necessarily words I consciously always enter into. Nor are they always as tightly sequential as I might now suggest. But, as I see the life of Jesus in and through me, these words, in one way or another, are experienced and expressed. So, for example, let's say I am not being patient. I confess this to God as the sin that it is. I may even have to seek the forgiveness of those I might have harmed with my impatience. I then thank Him that He has made me aware of this. I thank Him for loving me enough and being committed to me, that He would take the time to point out the lack of this flower. I then enter into an expectancy that He will begin to help me pull out the weeds of impatience and that I will soon, in His time, begin to enjoy the flower/fruit of patience in my relationship with Him and with others.

Submission is also involved as I wait for Him to bear this fruit in my life. Living with expectancy is another way of saying I live by faith, not by sight. As you know, this living by faith is rarely easy! It means we learn to wait on Him, not in resignation, but in expectant submission that He is more eager and committed to living out His life in me than I am. I can be extremely confident that He who began a good work in me *will* complete it.

And now, finally, comes the **celebration**. We see the flowers of patience, humility, etc. And we can even begin to celebrate, by faith, before we see the flower fully formed! These five words describe a faith dynamic that can help us in the showers of April, to enjoy the flowers of May as Jesus grows in and through us.

Brothers and sisters, please endure. Please don't be discouraged. The "flowers" are coming in our lives. Or, as our friend the Apostle Paul put it, "let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up." (Galatians 6:9)
