

God was waiting for me to join Him in a walk. Walks often function as my prayer time.

Sometimes I will listen to a podcast as I did on this walk. On this particular podcast, one of the hosts said the following: "God never looks in your mirror and wishes He saw someone else."

Now I know what some of you are thinking already—this is a podcast with "me-centered" teaching, a bit of "psycho-babble" that is not at all God-centered. Pastor Bob, are you trying to throw sanctification and becoming more like Jesus out the window? I mean, come on, God is happy with who you are now, the person staring back at you in the mirror? You're trying to tell me He doesn't want you to change?

I'm only voicing these possible objections because that's the way I would have responded to such a saying a few years back. But now? Now I see these words as an invitation to give up that nagging sense of shame that often invades and pervades my life. Self-loathing, for me, seems to be often only a step away from where I'm walking. Ray Ortlund, in his book *The Death of Porn* extrapolates a bit on this:

"Maybe you look at your mess and think: If God has any self-respect at all, he must despise me. He'd be wrong not to despise me. But that despairing thought keeps you hanging back from God. Self-punishment doesn't make you more forgivable. It blocks your way to forgiveness.

"He is inviting you to come out of hiding and stand tall again. He's not at war with you. Why? Because you aren't really all that bad? No. Because in one blinding moment of painful atonement on the cross, the dark energy of your evil forever lost its bid for supremacy.

God Likes What He Sees

"Do you really think, after the cross, your shame drives God away? Nope. Your shame is precisely where He can recreate you the most gloriously. You think you're disgusting to Him? Wrong again.

"The wrong things about you are where He loves you the most tenderly. God welcomes high-maintenance men who keep coming back to Him for more mercy and more mercy and more mercy, multiple times every day. He isn't tired, and He isn't tired of you." (p.34).

Now, perhaps, picture a boxer. Now, imagine this boxer hitting you as you try to enjoy your walk. It's kind of hard to enjoy your walk when you're getting hit over and over again. Our walk, our conversation, our listening to, our enjoyment of God is so hindered when we keep hitting ourselves, beating ourselves up over past sins, real or imagined.

Let me ask you a simple question related to our opening podcast quote. So, imagine God looking at you right now, as you look in the mirror. What is the expression on His "face?" What if, because you have been looking at Jesus (albeit imperfectly!), He sees the Image of His Son in you? Scripture says this is what our Father sees when He looks at you: The Image of His Son. (2 Cor.3:18-4:6) Paul goes on to say the life of Jesus is visible in our body(2 Cor.4:10)

Another simple question: Do you know, truly know, not just in your head (because you are supposed to!), but, in your deepest of hearts, that God loves you? The expression on His face as He looks at you is one of pleasure and pride. "This is my beloved son/daughter." (John 17:26)

May I encourage you in your walk? Please, put down the boxing gloves. Stop beating yourself up and keep accepting by faith, that out of love for you, Jesus took the blows from the Father that we deserved and was resurrected as the first fruits of God's new creation — and He is making us to be a part of that. So, please, go enjoy your walk with God. He's waiting for you.

some cider and donuts and oranges, along with some good lengthy conversation with his prayer/ communications support team.

Steve and his wife Merrilee are in semi-retirement, living in Steve's hometown of Fairmont, Minnesota, where he's planting fruit trees and vegetables on the ample land God has provided for them after decades of living in the cramped quarters of Hong Kong. Merrilee is enjoying the opportunity to tend her flower garden and leading a Bible study, while Steve is shepherding their church's young adult program. He also leads the local EFCA church's missions program, which he is developing into a congregation that sends missionaries into the mission field, a new avenue for service he finds truly rewarding. His "day job" remains with SALT, for which he travels in the U.S., maintaining contacts he has built over the years to retain financial support for the ministry.

Now that Steve and Merrilee are "back home," SALT staffing is handled in Hong Kong and in-country, with

Asian pastors serving as trainers, having once been trained themselves through the SALT curricula. They now have taken over the task of writing additional teaching programs. Each SALT graduate, already a Christian leader, learns not just the Bible-based material but also how to teach it so that the message can be multiplied throughout countries in Asia where Western missionaries are no longer welcome and where Gospel dissemination is difficult, at best.

SALT is helping to spread the Gospel into dark corners through these dedicated leaders, despite all the obstacles they face. Additionally, the in-country leaders are taking on the task of fundraising, with SALT expecting to phase out entirely within two years, having fully launched a self-sustaining ministry within closed countries.

The "At Any Cost" Mindset

Our Lord has taught us the first step in preparing for persecution, and our Chinese Christian family members have walked it out in exemplary fashion under a brutal Communist regime for more than 70 years. Christ instructed us to count the cost of discipleship and take up our cross daily. Following Him is costly, but since He is infinitely worthy, we must continue paying without a thought when persecutors raise the price by opposing us.

The Voice of the Martyrs' founder Richard Wurmbrand said, "A man really believes not what he recites in his creed, but only the things he is ready to die for." The first step in preparing for persecution is identifying the things we will do at any cost. We will read God's Word, pray, worship, gather with other believers and witness for Christ, and nothing will stop us from doing these things with willing and glad hearts. Because we do these things in obedience to the commands of our Lord, their worth is beyond evaluation. The value of everything else in this world pales in comparison, including our very lives.

When I talk with Christians here in the U.S. and in other free countries, the word that constantly comes to mind is *unprepared*. Persecuted Christians in restricted nations have counted the cost and considered Christ worthy, so they prayerfully approach each day with an obey-at-any-cost mindset. Anchored by an understanding of God's greatness and with their desires fixed on His eternal kingdom, they approach life differently from

Prepared for Persecution by Cole Richards, president, The Voice of the Martyrs most Christians in free nations. Too many Christians in free nations live in fear of those who oppose us while worrying about losing the things of this world.

For decades, our Chinese Christian family members have boldly, lovingly and humbly obeyed Christ, no matter how their government opposed them. When their gatherings were made illegal, they held church services anywhere necessary to avoid the secret police. And they also prepared for the inevitable arrests so that, when pastors were imprisoned, others in the congregation were ready to take their place. Meanwhile, the imprisoned pastors embraced their time in jail as a new ministry assignment from the Lord: They simply continued their work.

Today, the Chinese Communist Party has arrayed a horrifying technological apparatus against Christians. Hundreds of millions of facial recognition cameras help track believers' whereabouts and create a digital record used to punish them for their so-called disloyal and illegal activities. Their response to this heightened surveillance has been the same as their response to previous threats and attacks. They simply continue in obedience with joyful hearts, having counted the cost and considered Christ worthy of *any* price they must pay.

Are we, our families and or churches ready to respond to opposition in a likewise manner? If not, then we are not prepared for persecution.

Each year, we bring our sacred holiday cards to the South Wing, where we spend some time together addressing greetings, praying, and eating cookies. Included in our cards are heartlanguage Scripture verses designed to



bless the recipient, be that the intended prisoner or perhaps his guard or warden. It's communication with no response anticipated, And we pray that the message will land on the heart that God intends to reach.
