"Blessed are you when others revile you and persecute you and utter all kinds of evil against you falsely on My account. Rejoice and be glad, for your reward is great in heaven...." Jesus's words recorded in Matthew 5: 11-12a

Militant Islamists in the Sudan Armed forces just sent a Christmas greeting to Christians in the village of Doka by burning down their church.

The Sudan Church of Christ (SCOC) is one of the largest denominations in Sudan. The church has a very strong presence in the Nuba mountains of Sudan but is active elsewhere in the country, including Eastern Sudan, where the church in Doka is located.

Sudan's government has been dominated by Islamists in the military for decades. The militants refuse to give up power unless they are granted amnesty for their many crimes against the Sudanese people. As a result, the people continue to suffer persecution and affliction by those charged with their protection.

As we enter 2023, please remember to pray for our persecuted brothers and sisters around the world, especially in the "forgotten" places like Sudan. The persecution of the church in Sudan comes as a result of its effectiveness in spreading the Gospel message of love, forgiveness and reconciliation.

I write this on Dec. 26th, a day after Christmas, and, two days after the cancellation of both our Christmas Eve and Christmas Day services. I can't remember if we have ever had to cancel a Christmas Eve Service. Perhaps we have, but I can't recall doing so. I always feel torn with such a decision, preferring to "tough it out" and get to church, but then again, I have only two blocks to drive to get here!

Honestly, I felt a bit lost not being with you during those two days. You all have become so central to our lives, and not being with the Body of Christ during these holy days didn't feel so good. Can I even say, the Body of Christ here at CrossWay has become a household, a pillar, and a foundation for my family. Yes, I'll say it, and, for good reason, but I'm getting a bit ahead of myself!

You see, I am reminded of the new sermon series I will begin on January 8th on the Pastoral Epistles. These letters from the Apostle Paul will cover I and II Timothy and the book of Titus. After discussing this upcoming series with your Elders, I was led to preach from them for a few reasons. First, I have never preached through these letters! Second, with the Covid crisis somewhat behind us, I felt it was timely and important to hear what the Bible has to say about the importance of the local church and our relationship to it. That is what the Pastoral Epistles are all about. Paul himself tells us directly why he wrote I Timothy, telling his young protégé Timothy: "Although I hope to come to you soon, I am writing you these instructions so that, if I am delayed, you will know how people ought to conduct themselves in God's household, which is the Church of the living God, the pillar and foundation of the truth." I Tim. 3:14-15.

In II Timothy, Paul tells Timothy that he wants to "remind him to fan into flame the gift of God, which is in you through the laying on of hands." (II Tim.1:6). So

much of II Timothy is Paul encouraging Timothy, on a very personal level, how to stay faithful in ministry.

You may or may not be aware, but since Covid started and has somewhat abated, many churchgoers have not yet made it back to physical gatherings. They have preferred to stay at home and catch a service online. This has led many Christians to ponder the importance (or lack thereof!) of the local church and our actual physical gatherings. Over the course of this series, questions such as the following will be addressed:

- ▶ Is the local church necessary?
- ▶ What are the priorities of the local church?
- ▶ What are the roles/responsibilities of men and women?
- ▶ Who qualifies as a leader in the local church?
- ▶ What are the priorities of leaders, especially those who focus on preaching and teaching?
- ▶ How do we serve our widows?
- ► How should we use money and the other resources God has blessed us with?
- ▶ What should our worship look like?
- ▶ Is doctrine necessary, and, what comprises good doctrine, which makes us spiritually healthy, vs. false teaching, which leads to spiritual sickness and even death?
- ▶ And, finally, can one "do" or "be" the church at home, watching a service online via livestream, etc.?

Of course, while Paul knew nothing of the internet or "virtual church," these letters, I believe, have much to say about how we view/do church. As I close this month's article in *The Current*, I ask you to join me in praying that Paul's objective in these Epistles might be taken to heart by all of us. That is, as we reflect again on I Timothy 3:14-15, each of us would grow in our confidence on how we should conduct ourselves as God's household.

Think about that! Paul calls the church "God's household!" He also says it is the pillar and foundation of the truth. If the church, then, is the pillar and foundation of the truth — a truth Paul clearly articulates in these Epistles (see I Tim. 4:3, 6, 16; 6:3-4; II Tim.1:11-14; 4:1-4; Titus 2:1) — then we are engaged in something quite significant, even essential for our faith. May God help each of us to be men and women who are committed to His truth as we live it out together in His household of faith.
