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
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Decisions, decisions . . .

Both are practical volumes and handy to have in a church library, for when the need arises. They'll be displayed near the lobby coffee bar.



"He will rejoice over you with singing. . ." $\,$

(Zephaniah 3:17).

"In the church I will sing your praises."

(Hebrews 2:12)

"On what were its footings set, or who laid its cornerstone — while the morning stars sang together?" (Job 38:6-7)

"And they sang a new song, saying: "You are worthy..." (Revelation 5:9)

"They sang the song of God's servant Moses and of the Lamb." (Revelation 15:3)

We sing, the angels sing, and God sings. God loves singing. He loves singing over you. Just because.

While it is true the "voice of the LORD is also power-ful and majestic ..." (Ps.29:4), I believe the songs He most wants you to hear are songs born of redemption. Songs born of the delight He has in renewed relationships that were once estranged. That's the kind of songs He sings in Zephaniah and the kind of songs you hear being sung in the book of Revelation. Those are the kind of songs Jesus sings in churches that gather to praise Him. (Heb. 2:12)

Imagine a newborn baby. The baby of course is messy, needs to be cleaned up from the difficult event of birth. "There," the nurses, or new Mom and Dad might say, after cleaning up the newborn's first dirty diaper — "all clean!" Well, "all clean" of course until the next time (usually five minutes after the last clean-up!) and the spit-ups and messy-ups the newborn infant brings. All along the Dad and Mom, delighted to have this new family member, sing over the child. Lullabies. Songs of delight and comfort. They take the baby after another messy clean-up, wrap the baby in a blanket, get in the rocking chair and soothe the baby with singing.

Now I ask you: What has that baby done to "deserve" such tender love and care? You say, "absolutely nothing." The only thing the baby can "give" (beside the messes) is the inestimable joy that comes to the Mom and Dad, Grandmas and Grandpas and all the siblings, that "this baby is ours." We belong together. He or she came from me. The messes are just a part of the deal. So, I ask you, What do you and I bring to our Heavenly Father, as those who have been born-again into His family?

Just because He sings

Other questions: How many "messes" do we make each day—mental, emotional, relational, spiritual — those messes that often meander to and affect about every relationship around us? Sometimes I wonder if our Heavenly Father ever wants to stop singing over us.

At this point in my relationship with Jesus, while I get tired of me and imagine He does, too, the answer to this question has been a clear and convincing "NO!" It's His kindness, His singing over His wayward people that gives us the ability, incentive and motivation to repent, to come back to Him and begin to hear, again and again, the party music for the prodigal.

So let me ask you again: besides "dirty diapers," what do you bring to God the Father that would move Him to sing over you or invite you to come and sing new songs of salvation along with Him? I would suggest we really don't bring a whole lot, if anything, that would move Him to sing over us. What moves Him to sing over us, as far as I can tell, are two simple things: 1) His "just because" love, and 2) our need for His tender mercies – again.

Christian songwriter Matt Redmond penned a song titled "The Father's Song" based on the Father's singing over His restored people Israel in Zephaniah 3:17-18. Some of the words: "I have heard so many songs, Listened to a thousand tongues, But there is one that sounds above them all - The Father's song. The Father's love - You sung it over me and for eternity. It's written on my heart. Heaven's perfect melody. The Creator's symphony. You are singing over me - The Father's song. Heaven's perfect mystery - The King of love has sent for me. And now you're singing over me - The Father's song. You sing it over me – Father."

Think once again of the baby. Why do the Father and Mother love this precious child? Is it because of the sleepless nights, spit-ups, throw-ups, etc.?! Not at all, but the loving Mom and Dad love in spite of all that. Just because. This is their child. YOU are God's child. Whatever form your messiness might take, do not let it keep you from the love song of our God. Give Him your fears, your sins, your worries, yes, all your "messes" — all the things you are tempted to feel shame over — and listen instead, not to the voice of shame, but to the voice of a Father's delight in His child. Just because.
